Electromagnetic Fields and the Human Body

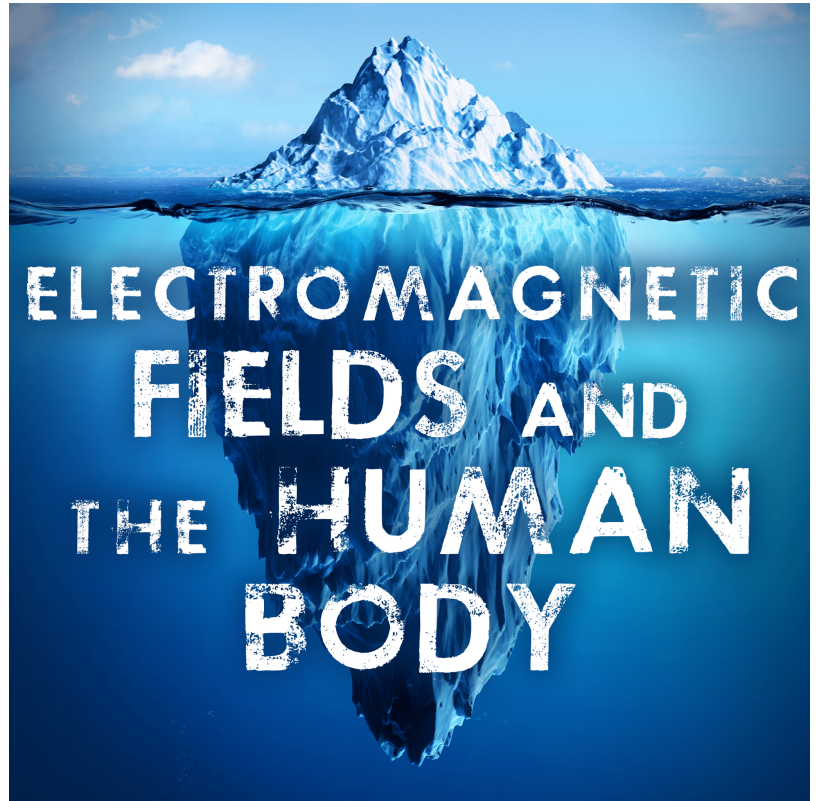
