Restoring an Invaluable Memory

Linda Swartz of Champaign, Illinois, thought a voice-recording of her late mother was lost forever until an electrician with a heart of gold intervened.

Since she was a child, Swartz had owned a cherished copy of the popular children's story *Frosty the Snowman*, which included a voice-recording of her mother reading the words of the story, but after years of use, corrosion took hold of the book's circuitry and the recording no longer worked. She continued to hold on to the book for sentiment, but after her mother passed in 2020, Swartz was especially saddened by the notion that the book could no longer play her mother's voice.

Electrician Lars Robins had been called to Swartz' home just before Christmas to take care of an electrical problem when he stumbled upon the book. Swartz told him the story of the book, and Robins, a former teacher, felt compelled to help.

"Helping people is the heart of what we do, so being able to help somebody in that kind of specific way, those opportunities don't come around too often but when they do you kind of jump on them," he explained.

Robins was able to clean the corrosion off the book's circuitry and got the recording to work again.

Swartz told WCIA News that she was shocked he was able to fix the recording.

"This is pretty special, brings tears to your eyes when you hear your parent's voice again," she said.

Replaced Roof

A generous company and kindly neighbor in Marietta, Georgia, came together in a big way for a struggling mother with a leaky roof.

Amy Koonce, a single mother of two, had been dealing with a very leaky roof for the last few years, Fox 5 reported, but she simply did not have the \$10,000 needed to fix it.

"I was worried about it, didn't expect to ever get it done because it's a very expensive project," Koonce said.

Serendipitously, Transformation Roofing & Home Services posted on its Facebook page on November 28 that it was going to give away a free roof to a family in need.
