Art for Valor

In Central Texas, a heartwarming story is unfolding, starring a young boy with a big heart and a talent for art, KWTX reported. Gunner Caldara, just eight years old, is not your average kid. He's the son of two Waco police officers, Kalyn and Frank, who are both deeply committed to serving their community.

Gunner's story took a remarkable turn when he decided to use his artistic skills to support a cause close to his heart — the American Valor Foundation. This nonprofit, founded by the family of Navy SEAL Chris Kyle, aims to support first responders, veterans, and their families. Chris Kyle, known as the deadliest sniper in U.S. history, tragically lost his life in 2013 while trying to help a fellow veteran.

Gunner's journey began when, at the age of six, he drew a simple but powerful image — a smiley face with the words "you are worth it." With the help of his parents, Gunner turned his artwork into shirts, hats, and stickers, which he began selling to raise money for the American Valor Foundation. His efforts caught the attention of Officer Jeff Kyle, Chris Kyle's brother and president of the foundation, who was deeply touched by Gunner's generosity and compassion.

Last year Gunner donated \$500 to the foundation, and this year he hopes to double that amount in time for the Chris Kyle Memorial benefit on April 27 in San Antonio. His story is a shining example of the impact that one person, no matter his age, can have on the world. Jeff Kyle expressed his admiration for Gunner, highlighting his selflessness and caring nature and encouraging others to follow his lead.

In New Hampshire, an uplifting story began when Jake McAlpin accidentally threw away his 16-year-old daughter Charlotte's beloved stuffed animal, Cupcake. Cupcake, a floppy-eared dog, had been Charlotte's faithful companion since she received it for Christmas when she was just four years old.

When Charlotte realized Cupcake was missing, McAlpin's heart sank as he remembered possibly tossing the stuffed animal in the trash. Determined to find Cupcake, Charlotte's stepmother, Meredith, took to Facebook, asking for help to open the dump.

Brian Monahan, the town's Selectman in Strafford, saw Meredith's post and sprang into action, WMUR News 9 New Hampshire reported. He contacted a colleague with keys to the dump and asked if he could assist in the search for Cupcake. On a rainy Thursday morning, March 7, the two embarked on a mission to sift through the trash compactors.

The compactors had compressed the waste bags so tightly that Monahan's colleague, Strafford Recycling Center Superintendent Dan Conway, had to use a backhoe to loosen the trash. Despite the unpleasant conditions, they were determined to find Cupcake. When McAlpin arrived and saw their efforts, he jumped in to help.

Together, the three men rummaged through the trash until, finally, they found Cupcake. The relief and joy were palpable. Conway remarked, "It made us feel pretty good; no one wants to be without their stuffy, and the smile on her face said it all."

The town's unity and willingness to go above and beyond for Charlotte and her cherished toy demonstrate the kindness and compassion that exist in the community.
