Anti-American Islamic Cleric Will Protest U.S. Plans to Remain in Iraq

"The first thing we will do is escalate the military resistance activity and reactivate the Mahdi Army in a new statement which will be published later. Second is to escalate the peaceful and public resistance through sit-ins."

After Defense Secretary Robert Gates stated that American troops could remain in Iraq for several more years, tens of thousands of protesters allied with radical anti-American cleric Moqtada al-Sadr took to the streets of Baghdad. **Salah al-Obaidi**, Sadr's spokesman, announced plans to continue the protests.

Baghdad Embassy Doubling in Size

"The staff will increase from 8,000-plus personnel that we have now to roughly double that by 2012. This will be an extraordinarily large embassy with many different functions."

The reasons for such a large number of personnel and this huge embassy complex, the largest U.S. facility of its kind in the entire world, weren't announced by U.S. Ambassador to Iraq **James Jeffrey**.

Government's Rolls Growing, Productive Sector Shrinking

"Today in America there are nearly twice as many people working for the government (22.5 million) than in all of manufacturing. This is an almost exact reversal of the situation in 1960 when there were 15 million workers in manufacturing and 8.7 million collecting a paycheck from the government."

Stephen Moore, an economist who writes for the Wall Street Journal, concludes that "we have moved decisively from a nation of makers to a nation of takers."







President Delivers \$2 Billion to Brazil for Offshore Oil Drilling

"Obama reaffirmed his insulting endorsement of boosting Brazil's energy economy in his [March 30] speech, leaving drivers across the country wondering why we continue to import over 60 percent of our nation's total oil consumption from foreign countries and leave vast resources here untouched."

Obviously perturbed by the President's action, Louisiana Senator **David Vitter** has introduced legislation labeled "the 3-D Act" that is designed to access our nation's plentiful domestic energy resources.

Interior Department Report Points to Untapped Oil and Gas Resources

The **Interior Department Report** stated that more than two-thirds of offshore leases in the Gulf of Mexico are sitting idle. Interior Secretary Ken Salazar indicated that this situation exists because petroleum companies are sitting on their hands. Industry spokesmen have disputed that claim and point to the slow pace of permitting for new wells as a major cause of the problem.
