There are shocking similarities between South Africa and the United States of America, explained Simon Roche, the director of foreign affairs for Suidlanders, an Afrikaner preparedness organization, in this episode of *Conversations That Matter*.

South Africa can serve as a jarring wake-up call for Americans, warned Alex Newman, senior editor for *The New American* magazine, pointing to Jacob Zuma, who served as the president of South Africa from 2009-2018 who has openly called for the mass murder of certain people groups within the nation.
